From Pastor Bill

My wife reminded me the other day of the time when we lived in Toledo when I said I would never use a computer. Others have reminded me of the times when I would make fun of those who thought that they had to take a cellular phone wherever they went. Are they really that important, I would ask?

Now, I use a computer all the time. In fact, I spend a lot of time in front of my Dell. I also have a cell phone that I tend to take wherever I go. I guess I have become one of the important ones!

I am grateful for my screens. In some ways, they have made my life easier and have enabled me to do so much that I wasn't able to do in the past. But I must admit that screens can be problematic for me, for many of us, and yes, for our culture as a whole.

One of our congregational goals this year is to continue to emphasize health and physical movement as integral to the life of discipleship. Screens can sometimes be an aid for our movement toward greater health. They can connect us, especially when we aren't able to get out of our homes. But sometimes screens can end up serving to make us less healthy and cause us to move less.

I am currently reading a book titled **Encounterism** in which Andy Field argues for the magic that occurs for most people when they meet up with other people. While I am so grateful for the way our live-streaming connects our congregation to so many people, I still feel strongly that being with people is preferable. First of all, being with people means that we have to move our bodies to make those encounters happen. But more than that, it entails sharing life in a more intimate way. We are wired for emotional connection and intimacy, I believe. They serve to make us healthier. Yes, being around people raises the possibility of picking up viruses. But not being around people brings with it serious threats to our health as well.

I enjoy my computer, and I appreciate my phone. But I think I would be healthier if I used them less often. I note how I rely on my phone to deal with my boredom, something I should embrace more. I note how crabby and preoccupied my grandson becomes when he is on his phone. I watch how so many people (some older and many younger) stop communicating with each other when they are at restaurants focused on their screens. I observe how many of our kids are not spending time in nature. I hear Dr. Phil when he warns us that our obsession with our phones and with social media is increasing depression and anxiety among our young folks.

We (I) would do well to take advantage of our (my) screens, but not allow them to become (my) our

From Pastoral Assistant Paula

I am thinking about core values these days. Values that frame the way we think, speak and act. Values which shape us as individuals, a society and shape our faith. As we begin what will most likely be a tumultuous eight months of divisional tactics, vicious rhetoric and fear-mongering, I wonder how we will stay grounded in love and live into our call as Christians. And what is that call in response to God's saving love for his people? It is a call the prophet Micah ushered to the people on behalf of God:

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? Micah 6:8

Micah's prophetic message comes on the heels of a dispute between God and his people about what is an appropriate sacrifice or offering. I encourage you to back up a bit and read through Micah 6:1-8 to get the jist of God's response to the people. You see, the passage of Micah 6:8 culminates with an answer. I surmise it may not be the answer the people expected. In fact, it may not be the answer they were seeking. They had focused on offerings — small and large. They emphasized sacrificial worship to the exclusion of justice and kindness. However, God's concern here was to point out that God requires more than sacrifice when entering God's presence.

We have just finished forty days of Lent and lived into the Easter resurrection. We have experienced sacrifice and lament and love in the journey. But our journey is not over. In fact, in a way it has just begun. We will need to look deeply at the core values God has proclaimed. The clarification in Micah 6 provides us with clear direction on what God expects of us. I don't know about you, but I find it a difficult task at times to live into God's requirements as God's people, especially when the world, our nation and our neighborhoods are often in contentious debate. Justice is perhaps not our default operating system. Humility is not second nature.

So what actions do these requirements call forth from us as we look into our neighborhoods and cities, governmental systems, political propaganda, genocide, starvation and oppression? What is required of us as individuals and a faith community? How do we live out God's call to do justice, love kindly and walk humbly with God? When I ponder a response to these questions, I often think of the school we support in Bethlehem, Palestine. Dar Al-Kalima School has artistically placed their core values in several places throughout the school: Faith, Hope, Love, Justice, Teamwork, Peace, Belongingness, Constructive Dialogue, and Tolerance.



The school principal, Anton Nassar, told me these values are integrated into their curriculum and extra-curricular activities. They also encourage all students, both Muslim and Christian alike, to live out these values even in the midst of occupation and war. That can't be easy. I don't think it's going to be easy for me, either, as this election year heats up and injustice seeps into every corner of the world. So won't you join me as we seek justice, do kindness and humbly walk with God - even, or especially, in a time of contentious debate, dispute and division? We need each other on this walk.
