From Pastor Bill

As we approach the New Year, I find myself reflecting on what 2024 can mean for me, our church, and for the world. While I don't want to appear to be naïve, I am convinced that the new year could mean some life-giving change.

There is no doubt that issues around the stewardship of our bodies need to be of serious concern for many of us. You and I are living in a time when so many of us struggle with obesity. I personally believe that this struggle is a societal one that demands more than individual action. I am convinced that until we address some of the systemic issues of our time we won't get very far in this struggle. Until we take a hard look at our fast-food system, until we examine what the desire for convenience has brought us in terms of the production of our food, until we eliminate food deserts, until we make our cities less car-centered, we probably won't adequately address the obesity epidemic. Our weight problems are not simply a matter of bad individual choice.

Yet, we as individuals do have a role to play. While we wait for a healthier food system and while we wait for a culture to create societal structures that contribute to health, we as individuals can make some changes in our lives that will aid us individually. I wonder how the church can assist with that. How can we bless you as you attempt to steward your body well?

Could we as First Lutheran:

- Help create walking groups
- Highlight in a bigger way our building as a place for walkers, pickleballers, cardio drummers
- Reduce our use of sugary snacks at coffee hour and other congregational food experiences
- Find ways to link people who are discovering ways to live healthier and to lose weight
- Encourage people to purchase CSAs (Community-supported Agriculture shares), which include locally grown vegetables
- Foster small group development that focuses on shared healthy meals
- Do a better job of promoting the resources that come from our yoga instructor, Sandy Hutchins
- Learn from those in our midst who have been active in fasting or other means to limit food's control of our lives

It strikes me that obesity is a public health crisis for our nation. We all need to work hard to do what we can to lead us toward greater health. Join me this year in thinking about how our congregation can assist with this hard work. After all, our bodies are temples for the Holy Spirit.

Emmanuel, God with us, is a glimpse of God through the lens of a tiny baby. It is a glimpse of God through the love which entered and continues to enter a world wrought with pain, suffering and somehow...hope. It is a glimpse of God where the longing of Advent and the promise of Christmas are both held within the same hope. The lament of Advent and the joy of Christmas living side-by-side. This is the story of Jesus - of hope that is born into the margins of society, into lands ravaged with war and into the seasons in our lives when we find ourselves asking, "Where is God?" The story of Jesus, you see, is the story of great joy and brokenness all wrapped into the incarnation of God.

I believe, that as this new year unfolds, we come with great expectation and with high hopes that things will be different. We enter this time with a new release on life that enables us to do better, be better and be happier. However, oftentimes these high hopes come because we suppress the past and think the future is in our control. But how *can* we forget the death of innocent people scrolling across our screens twenty-four hours a day? How can we forget the tragedy that unfolded on October 7 in Israel, or the 17,000 (and counting) Palestinians who have died, or those who continue to live as refugees, or those pushed to the brink of suffering, or the hostages who are still not free, or the West Bank still living under Israeli occupation for 75 years? How can we forget Ukraine and Russia have been at war for over 663 days and millions of people can no longer call home, home? How can we forget broken relationships that ended in divorce, a devastating diagnosis, a loved one living in addiction or thousands of people without healthcare or proper nutrition? How can we forget? We can't, nor should we.

You see, being honest about the past and open-minded about the future *is* living into "Christmas hope." When we allow the promise of Advent to usher us into a new year, we proclaim the love of the Christ child. New opportunity fueled by hope and founded upon God's faithfulness was the Israelites' story. It's our story, too. It's the age-old story we waited for and longed for during Advent. Our lives can fall apart in a million ways and try as we might to engineer our own happiness, there are certain realities we have to live with as we move forward into a new year. But somehow, joy meets us right in the depths of our can't make-it-work humanity.

Emmanuel, God with us, *is* a glimpse of God in the wonder and tears, through sorrows and celebrations and through the amazement and disbelief of life. As theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer writes, "The joy of God has gone through the poetry of the manger and the agony of the cross; that is why it is invincible, irrefutable. It does not deny the anguish, when it is there, but finds God in the midst of it." Through the lens of the tiny baby rests the basis of all that is most true and trustworthy: love. This is how joy comes to us.

So where do we get a glimpse of God in 2024? We get a glimpse of God through the lens of a tiny baby - a baby who keeps coming to a world that is *still* not right. And this baby keeps coming to you and to me and to our community to be God's love in human form. Emmanuel, God with us.
