From Pastor Bill

We at First begin our 2025 Fall stewardship campaign with an honest concern about our congregation's future financial well-being. I don't say this with any desire to induce panic. That would not be fruitful nor faithful. Yet you should know that our bottom line is not what it was even at the end of 2024.

We know that there is quite a bit of financial instability in the economy right now. Some folks are a little nervous about where the economy is heading and are being a little more cautious about spending and giving away money than they have been in the past. We take into consideration the big picture as we think about our little piece of the pie.

The past five years have been for our congregation the most robust in terms of money that I have ever experienced. In part, that was because of some large individual gifts, a couple of major estate gifts, and money from the government due to COVID. Lorey, our administrator, and I can report that we have had to sweat little over money these past five years. Before those years, life was different. And now it appears that we are returning to those more challenging years.

To address the challenge, we are trying to reduce some discretionary spending and are increasing some of our rental costs for those who use our facilities. That may make a small difference. But honestly, the church doesn't have much discretionary spending, which means that the primary place for us to make cuts would be in staffing and staff salaries. I hope we won't have to make such cuts.

The best way to address our financial outlook is to find ways to increase our giving. So, I do that with this letter. If you are capable of giving a special gift to our congregation, or probably more importantly, if you are able to increase the amount you give on a regular basis, or if you can begin giving on a weekly or monthly basis, please consider doing so. Some of us, when we choose what we are going to give, we give what we gave years ago. Obviously, \$25 or \$50 or \$200 is not worth what it was worth a decade ago.

My wife and I have tried to use the 80-10-10 approach to managing our money, which is matter of spending 80 percent of what we receive, saving 10 percent, and giving away 10 percent. Not all folks can manage their money in that way, I realize. But it is a way for us to make sure generous giving is a disciplined part of our weekly routine.

What is most important and helpful for the church is that our people participate in disciplined giving. We're all in this together. Part of the togetherness is sharing the financial load. And for me, this is not simply a matter of responsibility, but joy. It's fun to give.





From Pastoral Assistant Paula

I am writing this entry following my return from Church at the Crossroads Conference in September. It was the first of its kind and the organizers anticipated approximately two - three hundred attendees. You can imagine their reaction when eight hundred people registered for the event! The church where the event was held, Parkview Community Church in Glen Ellyn, Illinois, could accommodate three-hundred people but thanks to technology, everyone who registered could participate in person or via livestream.

At the onset of the conference, I asked one of the organizers how he felt about the overwhelming response to this first-of-its-kind conference. His reaction startled me a bit. He was full of emotion when he responded, "We had no idea so many people in the church are feeling the gut-wrenching effects of the violent escalation in Israel and Palestine." Church at the Crossroads, you see, was a gathering of Christians who recognize that the church is standing at a defining moment - a moment where Jesus is calling us back to the narrow way of the cross. And what does that look like today, for you and me?

Rooted in scripture and led by Palestinian Christian leaders, alongside pastors and peacemakers from across North America, this conference invited American Christians to engage in honest reckoning, prophetic reflection, and faithful action. Through worship, prayer, teaching, and fellowship, we were called to repentance, renewal, and courageous discipleship. Church at the Crossroads was a space to confront harmful theologies, rediscover the gospel according to Jesus, and stand with all who seek justice in the land.

There were times when the dialogue was uncomfortable. There were times when the personal testimonies brought me to tears and broke my heart. There were times when I had to re-examine what *my* faith and theology means at this pivotal moment in our history. If the gospel is not good news for all, then what is it? Fares Abraham, CEO of Levant Ministries exclaimed, "Expanding God's love is pro-Israel and pro-Palestinian - it's not a contradiction." And scholar Dr. Lamma Mansour of Nazareth, concluded her personal reflection with these words: *When we exercise the muscle of lament, we exercise the muscle to love.* I was grateful for the opportunity to attend this conference but in all honesty, I left wondering if I am at a crossroads of being called - not to comfort, but to faithfulness, peace, and costly love?

One final thought for now... Many times I hear people respond to all the political upheaval in the Middle East and say, "Well, it's complicated." Thank goodness Jesus didn't say, "It's complicated," and leave it at that. He did something. He came down.


