From Pastor Bill

Dear Friends in Christ:

The reality of the corona virus is affecting and obviously will affect our common life as a church. We must think about how we can respond to this unparalleled time in our culture. This certainly is a crisis time, but should not be viewed as a time for panic. We're in this together, and life will at some time burst through the veil of death.

The church is a community, and we can continue to care for one another, even if we cannot be with each other. Please call other members of the church just to check on them. If they are looking for someone to pick up food for them, we can find someone who is willing to do so.

For the foreseeable future, we will not be meeting as a community. Staying away from each other, and when we do come together, maintaining physical distance from each other are the ways these days we will be expressing the love of God. This won't be forever, but the absence from each other may be longer than any of us would like.

Worship at 10:30 on Sunday mornings will be hosted on Facebook Live. The experience will be briefer than normal, as might be expected. Bible study will be hosted on Google Hang Outs on Thursdays at noon. Beth Milligan will communicate how to connect to this through the e-newsletter and through Facebook. I may host another weekly digital experience, but that is yet to be determined.

Decisions will have to be made as to how we will

survive financially. If you are able, I would encourage you to continue your offerings. Mail them in, or join the many who give automatically. Those of you who are capable of giving larger gifts could be very helpful at this point. I commit myself to this kind of generosity.

Our church council will meet next Thursday on-line to talk about our financial situation. I would not want to create panic or anxiety, but temporary lays offs and/or reductions in salaries may be some of the choices we may need to face. The majority of our expenditures are for staff, so this is the place where reductions will need to be made. I treasure our staff and would hate to see these kinds of actions. But the nature of the times may require drastic measures.

We will weather this crisis. But it won't be without its victims (all of us). During this time of Lent, we tell the truth about death. It's real. But we trust that something is at work that is larger than death. We believe in resurrection. But in the meantime, we wait on God.

How does one begin a monthly news article in the middle of a global pandemic? It has affected *all* of our lives in one way or another. We have altered our routines, changed the way we do business and have been asked to *social distance* ourselves from one another. The term or concept, *social distance*, has appeared in every newsfeed around the world and has inundated conversations 24/7 these past several weeks. I was curious about the origin of *social distance* so I did a little research.

The term, or concept, takes on many connotations and has evolved over time as many sociologists have added to the original study of human behavior in this area. The onset of the initial theory was formulated in the 1890's and went on to include the "Social Distance Scale" which was created in 1925. The sociology behind many of the studies ranges from geographical separation, emotional separation and social distancing oneself (or groups) into a category that considers who is an "insider" and who is an "outsider or foreigner." A second approach views social distance as a normative category. In other words, it specifies the distinction between "us" and "them." If you find yourself with a little time on your hands, you may want to look up a few things about social distance, which has now become a mantra in circles around the world and attributed to slowing the coronavirus down and ultimately, saving lives.

So what do I write about when we are all separated physically and in need of community now more than ever? There is an age-old song that came to mind when I was thinking about social distancing and what draws us together as the body of Christ. You may know it. The song is called: They'll Know We are Christians by Our Love by songwriter Peter Scholtes. Here are the lyrics:

We are one in the Spirit, we are one in the Lord We are one in the Spirit, we are one in the Lord And we pray that our unity will one day be restored And they'll know we are Christians by our love.

We will work with each other, we will work side by

side

We will work with each other, we will work side by side

And we'll guard each man's dignity and save each man's pride

And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love

By our love. Wow! I believe this song encapsulates who we are as a faith community, not only at First Lutheran, but as the 'holy catholic church'' - the universal church. Miriam-Webster's definition of the term universal states: covering all or a whole collectively; existent or operative everywhere or under all conditions. The 'holy catholic church' is stated in the third petition of the Apostle's Creed which we read together during various seasons in the church to reaffirm our faith as a community; "I believe in the holy catholic church." That is, the true Christian church of all times and all places.

We are one...whether we gather in the building on Whitehall Road or not. And one day, we will sit in the pews together again, we will intimately share the peace with each other and we will lift up our voices in praise...together, in one space. But for now...we are one in the Spirit and to me, that's comforting. I don't feel so isolated when I place my hope in that promise.

And how do we work with each other, side-by-side, when we are told to *social distance* ourselves from community? We pick up the phone and call someone. Perhaps someone we haven't talked to in a while. Catch up or tell stories. Send a letter, note or card to people in care facilities, to those recovering from surgery or to those... who are dying. Address a card to the medical staff at local hospitals or to those who tirelessly stack shelves throughout the night or to those we know who travel cross-county in trucks to bring the goods. We deliver food, pick up meds and worship *online* when possible, at least for now. We sing a song, read the lectionary readings for the week and we exercise gratitude.

How will they know we are Christians...by *our love?* Well, you see, *this love*, the love of Christ proclaimed, isn't defined by distance, it's not determined by our physical presence nor is it diverted in the midst of a global pandemic. The love of Christ that is rooted in grace and lives in our hearts is alive and well. And one day, our unity *will be restored* and when it is...we will also be known by our love at that time, too.

"With the recent outbreak of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) continuing to spread in the U.S., please be assured that "blood donation is a safe process, and people should not hesitate to give and receive blood. We are dedicated to ensuring the safety of your donors as well as our employees and volunteers as we continue to run our blood drive operations.

Safety First

At each blood drive, Red Cross employees follow thorough safety protocols including wearing gloves and personal protective gear, wiping down donortouched areas after every collection, using sterile collection sets for every donation, and arm scrubbing. These mitigation measures will help ensure blood recipient safety, as well as staff and donor safety in reducing contact with those who may potentially have this respiratory infection.

In addition, please note that there are no data or evidence to show that this coronavirus can be transmissible by blood transfusion, and there have been no reported cases of transmissions for any respiratory virus including this coronavirus. Nonetheless, the Red Cross has implemented new blood donation deferrals out of an abundance of caution, asking individuals to postpone their donation for 28 days if they meet certain risk criteria.


