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From Pastor Bill

Dear Friends:

The experience of quarantine seems to be going on and on. Who would have thought that when we began the quarantine that by June we still would be hunkering down at home? Perhaps by the time you read this, the governor will have rescinded the stay-at-home order.

The rescinding of the order will likely mean our entrance into the first phase of the re-opening of our building. But know this: the return to church life will not be like the turning on of a switch. It will be a process—for us, a three-phase process.

The first phase involves more of the same. Worship will continue on-line with more folks involved. Yet some small groups will be allowed to meet. We will be talking about what this might mean for us. We might test out having groups of ten or less meeting for prayer, fellowship, and study. Groups like AA will likely return to the building, and some staff will return to their offices. All folks entering the building will be asked to wear masks and to practice physical distancing.

The second phase will include larger groups being able to meet, including perhaps people gathered for worship, although on-line worship will continue. We will work hard to limit the size of these gatherings, perhaps adding a service and asking for reservations for worship attendance. We will discover ways to provide for physical distancing. It wouldn't surprise me that we will hold worship sometimes outside or in our Family Life Center. Masks will be required during this phase as well. Shared food experiences will still not be allowed.

The third phase will find us less preoccupied with physical distancing and more open to larger group gatherings. Food experiences will be a matter of discernment. And the gathering of children together will be considered.

Throughout all of these phases, please know that we will work very hard as a congregation to keep our facility sanitized. We have purchased a fogger sanitizer and will increase the number of hand-sanitizer stations that we have. They will be highlighted with signs.

Also, through these phases we will encourage those who are sick to always stay away from public gatherings, including those of the church. And we would urge those of you who are particularly

From Intern Paula

This past week I came across a commentary from the San Diego Union Tribune entitled: *Church is never canceled. Even in the time of COVID-19.* The article was written by Pastor Tim Spivey of New Vintage Church in Escondido, California. I felt that much of what this pastor had to say encapsulates what the universal church is experiencing during this time of a global pandemic. So for my reflection this month, I would like to share a portion of this article with you and add a few comments at the end. Here are Pastor Spivey's comments:

Last weekend, many churches experienced a bitter first that may become a bitter second, third or tenth They didn't meet in person. For those who haven't belonged to a church before, it may not seem to be that big of a deal. For Christians, it is an enormous deal. Why? Because we believe God is there among us, we love being together, and because something special is formed in us when we gather. The church has gathered in person, regularly, for 2,000 years. People still come. They come when it rains (and snows). They come even when there are festivals, sporting events and other distractions at their disposal.

In times like these, I'm exceedingly grateful for the ability to gather online. It's just that what makes church so special is the people. What you miss is the smiles, the hugs, the joking around with the kids. The sights and sounds are so beautiful, what might sound like a cacophony to some is a pure symphony to the believer. Hugs, high fives, laughter, coffee and communion. We all know the difference between grandma and grandpa talking to the grandkids on Facetime and them scooping the kids up and hugging them as they come through the doorway. Online is the next best thing, but not the best thing.

Churches will be impacted enormously by meeting online. Some may never reopen. Some may go upside down financially and never recover. In turn,

this will negatively impact communities. Contrary to what some might believe, Christians make significant contributions to nearly every vital aspect of society: arts, music, education, and perhaps, especially, health care. Aligning with the suffering during times of uncertainty and calamity is profoundly Christian. This has been the case throughout history. During the Plague of Cyprian (a pandemic that afflicted the Roman Empire from about the year 250 to 262), 5,000 people died a day in Rome alone. Among them were two Roman Emperors.

The church has worshiped for 2,000 years and no virus will end that. This season presents some amazing opportunities for churches with eyes to see. But this is tough. It's also worth it. So keep loving your church. Write the encouragement note. Pray like you've never prayed before. Continue to give, click like, and share. Church is never canceled. Consider yourself invited. We may not wow everyone. That's okay.

Paula's comments: I, too, am grateful for the blessing of technology which enables us to stay connected and worship online. We can still gather as a church and it has allowed us to forge new connections - even globally. However, my heart aches as online worship explicitly has created gaps between generations, gaps among those in our society who are marginalized and separation of those who are most vulnerable. I miss visiting with people in nursing homes and hospitals. I miss holding the hand of those who are dying. I miss my grandchildren's laughter and love. I miss the stories of those who have gone before me and of those who come after me. I miss you. Nothing online can replace those human interactions that are life-giving. But languishing in lament will not advance God's mission. Yes, grief from the losses we have experienced and. I surmise will continue to experience, is real. But I feel we have a responsibility and as Pastor Tim Spivey put it, "...a season of opportunities" in which to see the church with new eyes. This brings hope and excitement to my heart. We are smart people. We are creative people. We are God's people and our stories, the ones which connect us to the ""big" story, need to continue to be woven throughout our lives. So, let's figure this out together. Let's be church...together. Online, offline or landline.


