From Pastor Bill

In some ways, it feels like we are living the plagues of the Exodus story: the pandemic, fires in the west, smoke in our skies, violence on our streets, hurricanes, bad storms, and floods. And for me personally, as the pastor of this community, I feel as if the plagues of sickness and death have been visiting this community of faith far too often. Funerals and memorial services lately have been the preoccupation of my ministry. I don't ever recall a time that has been so full of bad news as has this time. These feel like apocalyptic days to me.

Such a feeling makes me wonder about the apocalyptic writings of the Bible and the role that they might play these days. Most of these writings have their origins in dark days—days of great oppression. The book of Daniel was written during the reign of the nasty Antiochus Epiphanes, a reign that resulted in the so-called abomination of desolation: the sacrifice of a pig on the altar of the temple. The book of Revelation was penned during the Roman persecution of the early church. Both books were messages of hope for people who had every reason not to hope.

The primary message of the book of Revelation is not that God is busy manipulating the global stage to bring about the end of the world. No, the message of the book of Revelation is something like this: hang in there; this too shall pass. In the end, Revelation maintains, God wins.

Admittedly, I don't know what that looks like now, how the love-is-stronger-than-evil message speaks to these difficult days. We are too much in them to be too confident. But I do trust that life is bigger than death, that love is stronger than evil, that peace is more real than violence, that resurrection does come out of death. For me, faith in these days entails leaning into that kind of trust. It's not that it all will come out in the wash. I suspect that we will have many more Covid and non-Covid deaths in the near future. And I also sense that many difficult struggles are ahead for churches, schools, and our nation, But I am convinced that God has not abandoned what God created and that death will not be the only truth we will know. We do need to hang in there. The final chapter has not been written yet. God gets to speak the last word. And if the



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resurrection of Jesus is any indication of what that final chapter will be, life and love will win out.

For your information, we are in the process of making changes to our worship schedule. As the weather gets colder, we will have to move our worship into the building. In order to provide adequate social distancing, we will limit attendance to 50 people for each service.

Our schedule for worship beginning with October 1 will be this: Thursday evening service at 6:30 p.m. and Sunday services at 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. We have decided to eliminate the Saturday night service for now, since so few have been attending it and since having a Thursday service enables us additional time to do the editing of our recorded service that we place on Facebook and You Tube. Please know that this schedule will likely be for the rest of the year. We will evaluate how well this is working in a couple of months and then make changes if necessary. I hope that the decision to temporarily eliminate the Saturday night service will not be too difficult for our regular Saturday night worshipers. I trust that if they are choosing to attend in-person worship they will find our other options convenient for them. The Thursday service will provide a new opportunity for those who are gone for the weekends.

The limits on attendance underscore the significance of signing up to attend our services via the Eventbrite web site. If you do not have access to a computer or can't figure out how to sign up, please call the church office. We will be happy to sign you up.

As you attend, make sure that you wear a mask, sanitize your hands, and practice social distancing. We still won't be able to have congregational singing, but I am hopeful that in 2021, we will return to what for me is one of the most important parts of our worship.

Hang in there! And if you would like to talk to me about anything, please feel free to give me a call. I always want to be available for you. I love you.

Are You Receiving Our Weekly Emails?

First Lutheran Church sends weekly emails to every church member or friend we have an email address for. We send an Events email and a Prayer Line email, both are currently delivered on Fridays. Increasingly, we are relying on this form of communication to get important church announcements and updates to you on a timely basis. We hope, if you are receiving these emails, you will open and read them.

Our email service tells us, however, that many of you are not opening these emails. This has us wondering...

- 1. Does the church have your current email address?
- 2. Is the email going to your "junk" or "spam" folder rather than your inbox?

Here are some quick solutions to try:

If you believe the church has your email address, **please check your "junk" or "spam" folder.** This is the location for storing unwanted email as determined by a spam filter. Also called a "junk folder" or "junk mailbox," spam folders are created by mail servers as well as by the user's email program.

If you find emails from First Lutheran Church in your "junk" or "spam" folder, **move them to your Inbox**. In some email programs, you can add First Lutheran Church to your "Safe Senders" list. In Gmail, you can mark the email as "Not Junk" to ensure it reaches your Inbox each week.

If you believe the church does not have your current email address, please go to this link: https://www.firstlutheranmuskegon.org/engage/. Sign up for our emails by using the online form. We encourage you to use this form to submit your email address as Lorey in the church office does not have direct access to this database.

Feel free to invite your family members, friends, neighbors, coworkers, and others who might be interested in our church to subscribe to First Lutheran Church emails, too. All are welcome! They can update their email preferences at anytime and we do not share our email list.
